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1.0 Introduction

1.1 At Clarity Independent School it is our school policy that all children wear school uniform when attending school, or when participating in a school-organised events.

2.0 Aims & Objectives

2.1 Our policy on school uniform is based on the belief that school uniform:

- promotes a sense of pride in the school
- engenders a sense of community and belonging towards the school
- is practical and smart
- identifies the children with the school
- prevents children from coming to school in fashion clothes that could be distracting in class
- makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance
- is regarded as suitable wear for school and good value for money by most parents
- is designed with health and safety in mind

3.0 Jewellery

3.1 On health and safety grounds we do not allow children to wear jewellery in our school. The exceptions to this rule are; earring studs in pierced ears, small objects of religious significance, such as a crucifix on a chain or Sikh Kara (worn for religious reasons). We ask the children to remove these objects during PE, games and swimming for health and safety reasons. The school advises parents who wish their children to have their ears pierced to do so at the beginning of the school summer holidays to ensure they are healed and able to be removed for PE when they return to school in September.

3.2 Medical identification bracelets may be worn by children who have significant medical problems e.g. diabetes or epilepsy.

3.4 The school does not permit pupils to wear any make-up except very natural-appearing, unnoticeable makeup.

4.0 Hairstyles and Nails

4.1 The school does not permit children to have 'extreme' haircuts that could serve as a distraction to other children.

4.2 Hairstyles which are considered extreme such as tramlines, stars, shaved heads, Mohican cuts, or dyed, tipped or dipped hair are also not permitted. However, natural hair colours are permitted. Pupils with long hair must always have their hair tied up in a neat manner for safety reasons (particularly in PE, D&T or Science lessons) and to prevent potential contact with headlice.

4.3 Nails should be kept no longer than the end of the fingers plus 1-2mm for health and safety reasons. If a child attends school wearing longer nails, they will be asked to and supported to clip them to an appropriate length. Nails should be a natural colour for school.

5.0 Footwear

5.1 The school wants all children to grow into healthy adults. We believe that it is dangerous for children to wear shoes that have platform soles or high heels, so we do not allow children to wear such shoes in our school. Children are expected to wear black trainers to school with no sports logos or flashes of colour, as stated in the uniform list.

6.0 The Role of Parents/Carers

6.1 We ask all parents who send their children to our school to support the school uniform policy. We believe that parents have a duty to send their children to school correctly dressed and ready for their daily schoolwork. One of the responsibilities of parents is to ensure that their child has the correct uniform, and that it is clean and in good repair. NB if parent / care-giver find this difficult to supply for any reason but especially including financial reasons, they can contact the school who will provide support regarding appropriate suppliers and assistance based on financial income verification.

6.2 If any parent/carer would like the school to modify the uniform policy, they should make representation, in the first instance, to the Head Teacher. The school welcomes children from all backgrounds and faith communities. If there are substantiated reasons, for example on religious grounds or their special educational needs or disabilities, why parents want their child to wear clothes that differ from the school uniform, the school will look sympathetically at such requests.

7.0 Uniform

Below is a list of uniform your child will need for school:

7.1 Daily uniform:

- White polo shirt
- Light grey tracksuit bottoms
- Black tracksuit bottoms are also permitted for girls in Key Stage 3 and 4
- Black or grey shorts
- Light grey sweatshirt or light grey zip up top (no hoods allowed on tops)
- Socks and black trainers/comfortable black shoes.

7.2 PE Kit - This will be left in school:

- White plain t-shirt

- Black or navy PE shorts
- Spare pair of socks and spare pair of trainers/pumps.

7.3 Bush School (Tuesdays):

- Warm outdoor clothing
- Waterproof coat
- Wellies – These are to be left in school
- Preferably a spare pair of socks
- Optional - gloves and hat in very cold weather
- In extremely wet weather, waterproof trousers would be beneficial and a change of clothes.
- In extremely cold weather, thermal underclothes are also useful.

7.4 Swimming (Fridays)

- Girls: One-piece swimsuit or shorts and swim top meeting in the middle
- Boys: Shorts (not long, baggy shorts)
- Towel
- Goggles, nose clip and ear plugs (only if required by your child)
- A waterproof bag to keep their swimming things in, separate from their books etc.
